**Times Past** — By Stephanie Dieterich

#### RENAISSANCE— A revival or renewed interest in something.

What is now referred to as "Old Gretna" has held the seat of Jefferson Parish Government since 1844. It was a thriving downtown business and shopping district with well-maintained homes for decades, and then it wasn't!

The opening of the GNO Bridge in 1959 spurred the growth of new subdivisions and shopping districts along and across the new Westbank Expressway. Businesses in Downtown Gretna closed down or moved away. Residents left their older homes for modern brick ones in the newer neighborhoods.

Old Gretna began to stagnate, becoming undesirable.

Once beautiful homes and buildings were torn down for the likes of junkyards and parking lots or left to decay as property values declined.

In 1969, a few concerned citizens, alarmed by this tragedy, got together to form the Gretna Historical Society with the purpose of preserving and promoting the history of Gretna. Original members included society organizer and first President Lloyd Gomez, 1st Vice president Everette Gauthreaux, 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice president W. Richard White, 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice president Wayne Salathe, 4<sup>th</sup> Vice president James Titterington, Secretary Katherine Steiner, Treasurer Mrs. Joseph Billa, and Historian Henry Thoede.

Their first project was to raise money to restore the dilapidated David Crocket Fire Hall and the surrounding Strehle and White homes. Mission accomplished!

In 1972 the fire hall was heavily damaged by fire and once again the Society stepped up, raising the funds to rebuild and repair the damage.

In 1984 GHS President Ronnie Harris started a drive to save the Train Depot. It was no longer needed by the railroad who agreed to give it to the Gretna Historical Society if they would move it. At the time, it was located at 4th and Dolhonde Streets. The Society wanted to save it and move it back to its original location on 4th and Huey P. Long Avenue. Mayor White vehemently opposed the idea. He said it was "a hicktown depot" and would be an eyesore and make the city look foolish. Gretna Police Chief B. H. Miller Jr. called it "a shack about to fall down." Luckily, Aldermen Uzee, Schexnayder, Marchese and Bush were in favor, with LeBouef being the only one against. So strongly did Mayor White feel against saving the depot, he vetoed the Alderman's motion. The Aldermen overrode the Mayor's veto and it was defeated by the same 4-1 vote.

GHS raised the money to move and restore the Train Depot; it is still owned and maintained by the GHS. Today it's a focal point in Downtown Gretna and leased to the Gretna Farmers Market.

Society member Mary Grace Curry was the driving force getting the David Crocket Fire Hall, the Old Steam Pumper, Gretna City Hall, St. Joseph Church and Most Holy Sacrament Convent Complex listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1983.

By 1985 the oldest parts of Gretna were designated a National Historic District, thanks to the hard work of Mary Grace Curry and other GHS members who tirelessly walked the streets to inventory the City's historical buildings.

It was slow going at first but "Old Gretna" is now a coveted location. Businesses are moving in at warp speed. Houses don't sit very long on the market and prices exceed those most everywhere else on the Westbank. Yes, Old Gretna is definitely experiencing a Renaissance and Gretna Historical Society was there from the start!

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#### ABOUT THE GHS AND HOW TO JOIN

The Gretna Historical Society was founded in Gretna, Louisiana, in 1969, by Lloyd E. Gomez (insurance man, volunteer firefighter, and community activist), who descended from Gretna pioneers, German immigrants Claudius and Catherine Nuss Strehle. The Society's articles of incorporation were drafted by Gretna attorney Everette F. Gauthreaux and signed in his law office on October 26, 1969. Today, the GHS operates the Gretna Historical Society Museum Complex at the corner of Lafayette Street at Second. It consists of three 19th century Creole cottages, a blacksmith shop, and the Louisiana Fire Museum. The GHS also owns and maintains the caboose and train depot on Huey P. Long Avenue at Fourth Street.

There are no requirements for membership in the GHS, other than the timely payment of annual membership dues of \$25 per person. Monthly meetings are held at the St. Joseph Complex Gym at 7th and Newton Streets on the second Thursday of every month at 6:00 p.m. The society's newsletter, *Gretna Chronicles*, is published monthly and mailed or emailed to all members.
